Girls' New Puberty Concerns

Did you know that a generation ago less than 5% of girls started puberty before age 8? Now its 10%+

Coming soon an, innovative digital health education campaign focusing on why early puberty* happens, why it matters and practical recommendations to reverse this trend.

Why is this this campaign important? Aside from the obvious, that 8 year old girls aren't mentally or socially developmentally ready for 13 year old bodies, early puberty is associated with childhood obesity which in turn raises lifetime risks for a number of health problems.

The most at risk populations for early puberty correlate with populations at

higher risks for health disparities; low income, inadequate health education, lack of access to healthy, nutritious, food and few options for safe or effective exercise opportunities create systematic disadvantages. These same populations may lack adequate health insurance, may experience high stress levels and may be exposed to more environmental pollutants.

Body mass, stress, lack of sleep and hormone disrupting chemicals in our environment can all influence early puberty. Research has shown that early puberty and late menopause are themselves associated with increased lifetime breast cancer risks. Having this information is the essential first step for individuals and communities to understand what needs to change and to be empowered to act.

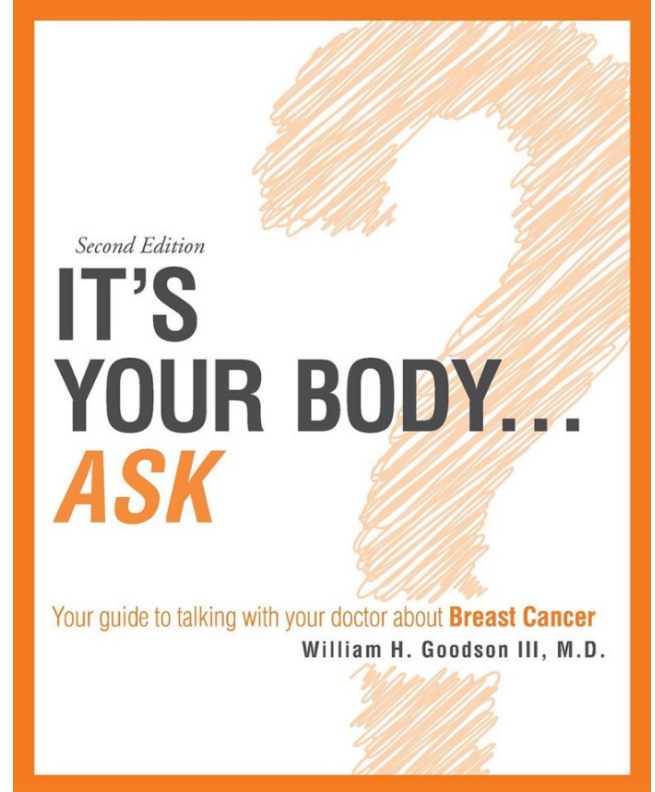
